

3 Cenotaph
Kingsway, Stoke.

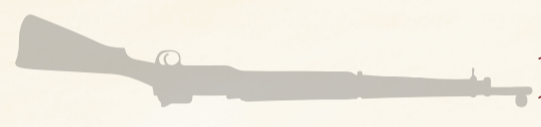
An imposing, brick-built monument surrounded by low walls, constructed in 1938. It replaced an earlier memorial, a replica of the Whitehall cenotaph, built in 1920. The current memorial features bronze plaques dedicated to 'THE GLORIOUS DEAD 1914-18/1939-45', with others commemorating the WWII battles of Dunkirk, Normandy and El Alamein, and the Korean War. The cenotaph was awarded grade II listed status in 2017.

2 Church of St Peter Ad Vincula
Glebe Street, Stoke.

The present church was designed by Trubshaw and Johnson and dates to the period 1826-30. It replaced a 13th century church, a small portion of which was reconstructed in the churchyard in 1881. The church displays strong links with the local ceramic industry. Josiah Wedgwood and members of the Spode family are buried there. The grade II listed church features a First World War memorial window designed by Gordon Mitchell Forsyth.

1 War Memorial Arch
Stoke Railway Station.

Originally unveiled in August 1922. The arch is supplemented with four brass plaques listing the names of employees of the North Staffordshire Railway killed in the First World War.

6 Bethesda Chapel
Albion Street, Hanley.

This A grade II* listed chapel, once dubbed 'the cathedral of the Potteries', is situated in Hanley. The chapel was built by the Methodist New Connexion in 1819 and once accommodated the largest Methodist congregation in the Potteries. The impressive colonnaded facade was added in 1859. The chapel has an 'Our Boys' exhibition commemorating their men lost in WW1.

5 Roll of Honour
Fenton Magistrates Court.

A plaque of ceramic tiles positioned on the main staircase of Fenton Town Hall. The roll of honour features the names of 498 First World War casualties from the Fenton area.



4 Cenotaph
Albert Square, Fenton.

The grade II listed memorial comprises a sandstone obelisk resting on a square base with projecting buttresses. It is characterised by the figure of a soldier, who stands with head bowed and arms reversed. The base is decorated with moulded wreaths and the Fenton coat of arms. It also features three bronze plaques with the words 'SACRIFICE', 'COURAGE' and 'HONOUR'.

13 Middleport Pottery
Port St, Middleport.

Built in 1888-89 by the firm of William Leigh and Frederick Rathbone. The factory, which still houses an active pottery business, are grade II* listed and will host the iconic Weeping Window Poppies installation in August and September 2018.



14 Cenotaph
Memorial Gardens, Tunstall.

A sandstone obelisk unveiled in 1928. Constructed to commemorate Tunstall's losses in the Great War, the memorial was later amended to recognise casualties of the Second World War. A roll of honour bearing the names of Tunstall residents killed in 20th century conflicts was erected to the south of the cenotaph in 2009.

15 Museum Exhibition

8 War Memorial
Albion Square, Hanley.

Situated outside the town hall, this bronze statue of a mourning Britannia on a sandstone pedestal, was produced by the sculptor Harold Brownsword, who was born in Hanley. The memorial was erected in c.1920 to the fallen of the Great War. The pedestal was later amended to commemorate the Second World War. The pedestal also features bronze plaques bearing the emblems of the Navy, Army, Air Force and Red Cross. The memorial is grade II listed.

7 Roll of Honour
Hanley Town Hall.

Situated inside the entrance to the building, this large, three-panelled bronze plaque with ornate wooden frame features the names of First World War casualties from the Hanley area. A smaller marble plaque was installed in 2012, to commemorate those who were not included on the original memorial.

10 Gladstone Pottery Museum
Longton.

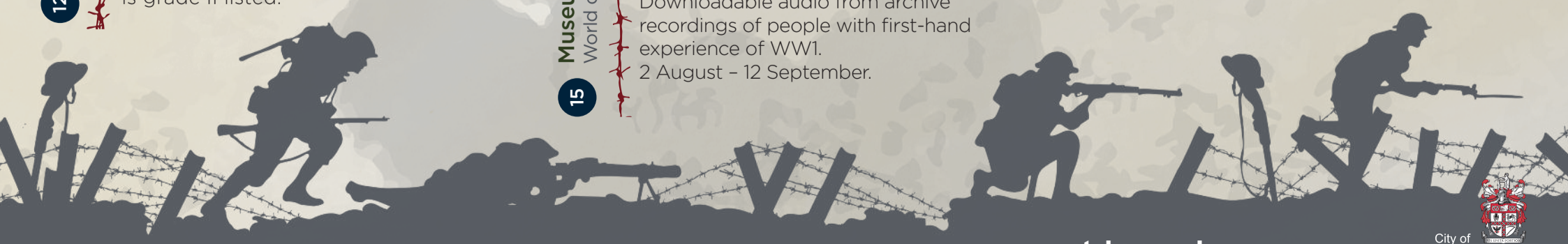


11 War Memorial
Longton.

Located on the outskirts of Queens Park (Longton Park), the monument takes the form of a squat sandstone tower with a square memorial chapel at its base. The chapel contains 18 marble plaques inscribed with the names of Dresden residents killed in the two world wars.

12 Cenotaph
Swan Square, Burslem.

This sandstone memorial was built in c.1920 and features the figure of a soldier with a bowed head, above which is carved '1914-19'. The memorial was later modified to commemorate the Second World War. The monument is grade II listed.
