Head south for Trentham Gardens (open daily, ticket prices vary, car park on site); occupy the hour-long bus ride or 20 minute car journey there by downloading and listening to Wedgwood and the War (available on www.appetitestoke. co.uk), an audio artwork drawn from the Wedgwood Museum's archive of letters sent by family members during World War One. Trentham Gardens itself boasts Italian Gardens revived by a Chelsea Flower Show Gold Medallist, a mile-long, Capability Brown-designed lake - complete with ecofriendly catamaran Miss Elizabeth (every hour, five days a week in summer, £2) - a meadow with giant dandelion sculptures, atmospheric woodland trails and much more. The Italian Garden Tearoom serves traditional Staffordshire oatcakes and iust outside the gardens is Trentham Shopping Village, a complex of timber lodges housing 77 shops and 18 cafés. All in all, Trentham Gardens present an unforgettable end to a day in The Potteries.

If you're staying over, options for the evening include food at Trentham Shopping Village or journeying on to Barlaston for local-born actor Neil Morrissey's excellent pub Plume of Feathers. Alternatively, take a trip back towards Stoke: The White Star pub here has been commended for its local beers. Bar, cafe and music venue the QUARTER can be found in the centre of neighbouring town Hanley, offering homestyle bistro food, award-winning tea and coffee and a varied drinks menu.



THE ITINERARY

Stoke is your starting point for the day. Home to the main railway station, the town also plays host to an extraordinary installation by artist Luke Jerram called the Museum of the Moon at King's Hall (21-29 August, free entry, special events will be ticketed); measuring seven metres in diameter, a moon featuring detailed NASA imagery of the lunar surface is accompanied by a surround sound composition by BAFTA and Ivor Novello award-winning composer Dan Jones. Evoking lunar inspiration and cultural myths, the installation is paired with a series of special moon-inspired events see www.appetitiestoke.co.uk/whatson for details and opening times. Just round the corner is the newly opened, Alice in Wonderland-inspired The Rabbit Hole **Tea Room;** serving up afternoon tea in a

storybook setting, it's well worth a visit.

Next stop is Hanley. a short bus ride from the station, where you'll find The Potteries Museum & Art Gallery (open daily, free entry, pay on arrival at car park opposite). home to the most significant collection of Staffordshire ceramics in the world including 667 cow creamer jugs - galleries covering natural science, archeology and fine art, as well as the superlative Staffordshire Hoard, Discovered by a metal detectorist in 2009, the largest hoard of Anglo-Saxon treasure ever found was once the possession of kings; it amounts to over five kilos of gold and one and a half of silver, features over 3,500 garnets from as far away as Sri Lanka, and includes pieces over 1,300 years old. The museum is also holding a special display "Made by the Girls of Staffordshire...": Ceramics from World War I (27 July - 22 August) featuring objects from its collection "Made by the Girls of Staffordshire during the Winter of 1917 when the Boys were in the Trenches fighting for Liberty & Civilisation", as well as CSI - Scientific WW1 (15 September, 11am-4pm, free), a one-off interactive event showcasing the science behind the First World War, including trench archeology and the chemistry behind explosives. There will be a replica underground tunnel, a medical display and an Ask an Expert panel primed to give insights into any wartime photographs and medals visitors bring.

A five to ten minute walk from The Potteries Museum & Art Gallery is the Emma Bridgewater Factory (open daily, car park on site) - where you can take part in the decorating studio (advance booking, 1hr 30min slots 9.30am-2.45pm, £2.95 fee plus price of piece) or follow a factory tour (advance booking, 1hr, 10am, 11am and 1.30pm except Fridays, adults £2.50/ under 16s free) to discover the traditional skills of the jiggers, jolliers, fettlers, casters and decorators who work here: each of the 1.3m pieces of pottery produced annually by the factory still passes through 30 hands before being sold. Stop for a home cooked lunch in the café, where the recipes are often inspired by Emma Bridgewater herself, or take tea and cakes in the factory's secret walled garden.

Fans of BBC Two's The Great Potterv Throw Down will recognise the next destination: a short bus ride or short car journey away is Middleport Pottery (open daily, £5.50 adults/£4 conc., no on-site parking - follow signs for temporary car parking, Aug-Sept), an award-winning, Grade II* listed site that was originally built in 1888, and has recently undergone a £9 million restoration by The Prince's Regeneration Trust. The factory tour here (advance booking, 1hr, 11am and 1.45pm Monday - Thursday, 10.30am Friday, £9.50 adults/£8 conc.) reveals every stage of production, showcasing handcraft methods used since the 1880s and the steam engine that once powered the entire factory - while the shop offers up the world's largest collection of local Burleigh pottery. When visiting Middleport, look out for special activities in nearby Burslem such as the Burslem Summer of Art (28) July - 16 September) festivities: there will be a poetry trail on public transport, arts trail WHAT IS NOW featuring artists and curators working in six pop-up locations. Burslem in Bloom and Bunting, an Artists' Open Weekend, music festival weekends, a WW1 themed real ale trail and Staffordshire Filmshow, as well as three major exhibitions showcasing local artists (see visitstoke.co.uk/summer for more details).
